

In order to say if you also do or don't do an action in Spanish we use **también** and **tampoco**, which you already learnt in Unit 5.

With verbs like **gustar**, **encantar** and **interesar**, we use **a mí también** / **a mí tampoco** / **a mí sí** / **a mí no**. With all other verbs we say **yo también** / **yo tampoco** / **yo sí** / **yo no**.

Note that in Spanish we do not use auxiliary verbs (**do** / **does**) but we use the subject pronoun (**yo**, **tú**, **ella**...) to emphasise the agreement or opposition:

- Voy a la universidad los viernes.
- Yo también. > So do I.
- Voy a la universidad todos los días.
- (Pues) Yo no. > I don't.
- Nunca voy a la universidad los viernes.
- Yo tampoco. > Neither do I.
- No voy a la universidad todos los días.
- (Pues) Yo sí. > I do.

SAYING THE TIME

Saying the time is very similar in English and in Spanish. We can both use the 12 or the 24-hour clock (although the use of the 24-hour clock in Spanish is restricted mainly to timetables and schedules in airports, buses, and train stations).

In both languages we say how many minutes are past or are left to the next hour when we use the 12-hour clock. The main difference is in the order we say this information and the elements we need to include in the sentence.
